out the world. OGHS funds are being used to support Ukrainian refugee centers today. Presbyterians give about \$8 million annually. This special offering will be received on **Easter, April 17** as we celebrate the mira-



cle of the resurrection and Christ's victory over the powers of disaster and death. Please give.

Recycling

Help us be good stewards of God's creation. We are a recycling center for several items.

- **Recycling paper, glass, and plastic.** If you are not able to participate in Hoopeston's curbside program, bring your recycling to church. Pickup is every other Friday. Recycle bins are outside by the trash bins.
- **Recycling batteries and light bulbs.** Both batteries and CFL bulbs contain toxic heavy metals. Bins for these smaller items are on the counter in fellowship hall.

- **Recycling pop tabs.** Tabs are collected for recycling to support the Ronald McDonald House at Riley's Children's Hospital in Indianapolis.

Easter Worship, April 17

They found the stone rolled away from the tomb. "His is not here, but has risen," the voice said. Resurrection. He is risen indeed! On Easter morning we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ our Lord. We receive the

greatest of all gifts: that suffering and death are not God's last word for us. We sing. We worship. We commune. We ring bells. Even Easter Lilies boldly shout out that he is risen indeed.



We Arise because Christ Arose

Excepts from the book *Coffee with Calvin: Daily Devotionals,* by Donald McKim, 2013. At the time of the Reformation, John Calvin was a pastor and writer who articulated much of the Reformed and Presbyterian approach to faith. Donald McKim is a Calvin scholar and works for our denomination's Westminster John Knox Press.

When we affirm the Apostles' Creed that we belived in the resurrection of the boy, we are making a stupendous claim. It is a claim that cannot be known by reason or logic. It is a claim known only by faith.

But in the Christian faith, to proclaim resurrection is not an empty and vacuous version of wishful thinking, some form of pie in the sky, by and by. Faith in our resurrection makes our resurrection possible.

This was the Apostle Paul's argument in 1 Corinthians 15, the great chapter on resurrection that is sometimes called the spinal column of the New Testament. God raised Jesus Christ from the dead, his resurrection being the "first fruits of those who have died." To put it in Calvin's language, "we arise because Christ arose."

Christ's resurrection is the pledge and prelude to our resurrection. Today, in our flesh, we "bear about the death of Christ himself."



Christ died for us, in our bodies, here and now. But in the future, we anticipate the resurrection of the body. Nothing is less likely, said Calvin, that that our bodies should be deprived of Christ's resurrection. Christ's death and resurrection are one act; and the benefits of both are for us, now and forever.

Our resurrection hope is grounded in the reality of Christ's resurrection life. Our hope is build on nothing else. Because he lives, we too shall live!

> "We must hold to that fellowship which the apostle proclaims: that we arise because Christ arose. For nothing is less likely that that our flesh, in which we bear about the death of Christ himself, should be deprived of Christ's resurrection."



Since Russia invaded Ukraine late last month, Presbyterians Disaster Assistance (PDA) as committed rapid response solidarity grants to five ecumenical partners in Eastern and Central Europe addressing the humanitarian crisis created by the unprovoked attack.

Recipients include the Friends of Community of Sant'Egidio, who are still in Ukraine, and Hungarian Reformed Church Aid, which is essentially the PDA of the Hungarian Reformed Church, said Susan Krehbiel, PDA's Associate for Refugees.

"We are part of a church," Krehbiel said. "And so, we have church relationships, and that gives us a different way of entering into this work that is special. It means we're grounded in those relationships and people that have relationships in the community."

In situations such as Ukraine, Krehbiel says PDA's role is finding organizations on the ground, in the communities that need help, and helping to build their capacity to assist through the generosity of donors to PDA, including through the One Great Hour of Sharing special offering. She cites the Hungarian Reformed Church as an example.

"They have relationships with individual congregations," Krehbiel said. "Then they have relationships with local governments, they have relationships with other ecumenical churches and organizations that do this work. And they get international support, not just from PDA, but also from other Reformed churches in the world.



'So, it's helpful for us to not only have the direct relationship with them, but also to know that they're in relationship with others, so we can see the whole picture, and we're able to work with the other national and international partners to see that resources get to them."

PDA is also providing support to Hungarian Interchurch Aid and Lutheran World Federation through its longtime international partner ACT Alliance, and the International Orthodox Christian Charities in Romania. Krehbiel said that all partners are saying they see Ukraine as a long-term response that will require continued support.

The Rev. Dr. Laurie Kraus, director of PDA, said the outpouring of response from Presbyterians has been unprecedented, and that she is hearing the same from other denominations.

"It's a massive, massive refugee response that's still unfolding, and that could escalate into a much different sort of issue," Kraus said, noting it is the largest refugee crisis in Europe since World War II.

As of Monday, 3.6 million people have left Ukraine and 6.48 million have been displaced within the country. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance has extensive experience responding to refugees in the United States and abroad.
