

- Approved Elder and Deacon Elects to be ordained and installed to office on Jan
- Set the Annual Meeting of the Congregation for Feb 5 after worship.
- Made plans to repurpose the old preschool room into a childcare and younger youth group room: repair and paint walls, clean carpets, discard or reuse furniture other materials in the room. Funding from the McFarland Fund.

- Distributed about \$2,600 of net proceeds from Pasta Dinner to support both community needs and ministry needs within the church.

Pasta Dinner Rocks

We weren't sure how many would come to the Pasta Dinner this year after missing the previous two years, but now we know. More than ever! We had about 300 for dine-in and about 200 for take-out, with about



\$4,200 in ticket sales, well beyond previous years. The November 11 dinner was **PASTA** such a blessing for all who worked and Dirrice all who attended. Yum!

We're grateful to Vera Keller for organizing us once again. We're grateful for our guests. We're grateful for all who decorated, prepared, cooked, served, and cleaned up afterwards. It takes a village to feed a village.

Expenses were about \$1,600, and as it does every year, the Session returned about half of the net proceeds to the community and retained half to build up our own ministry. Here's the distribution: \$250 Heritage Health Activities Pro gram, \$250 Autumn Fields Activities Program, \$400 HART Animal Shelter, \$300

Multi Agency, and for our ministry - \$150 Christmas lights, \$500 Kitchen Fund, \$650 to begin a new fund to renovate the parking lot island with new trees and better lighting of the lot.

The Pasta Dinner provided Good News for both our community and congregation. Thanks be to God.

Why do Presbyterians Baptize Infants?

(By David Gambrell in Presbyterian Worship: Questions and Answers, Westminster John Knox Press, 2019.)

A sacrament is a funny thing. It is a gracious act of God, and at the same time, a human response of gratitude. Understanding this little bit of sacramental theology helps us to understand the difference between infant and believer's baptism, and more importantly, to understand how they can still be one and the same sacrament.



We baptize infants because God chooses, claims, and calls us long before we are able to respond to God's grace. The baptism of infants thus emphasizes God's gracious action, underscoring classic Reformed (Presbyterian) theology about "election," how God chooses us for salvation.

We baptize adult believers (who have not already been baptized) upon the profession of their faith because God's gracious action calls for our grateful response. The baptism of believers thus emphasizes our response to God's grace, demonstrating the central Reformed tenet of salvation by grace through faith.

Seven words from the New Testament sum it up perfectly: "We love because God first loved us." God loves us first. There is nothing we can do to earn God's grace. It is a pure gift of love, unexpected and underserved. This is why we baptize infants. But because God first loves us, we love. Because of the great love of God poured into our hearts, we are able to love God and one another. This is our grateful response to God's grace, our faithful response to God's faithfulness. This is why we baptize believers upon profession of faith.

Sometimes people are presented for baptism who do not fall neatly into one of these categories. Examples include children between the ages of infancy and adolescence or people with cognitive disabilities. This is when it is critical to remember that there are not really two kinds of baptism; there is but one sacrament practiced in different ways, depending on the age and situation of the one baptized. In these cases, pastors and elders must work to discern which practice is most appropriate – relying, as always, on the grace and love of God. Indeed, it is on this grace and love alone that our salvation depends.

Does God Answer Prayer?

(By Donald McKim in Presbyterian Questions, Presbyterian Answers, Westminster John Knox Press, 2017.)

Yes. Presbyterians believe God answers prayer. We believe it because the Bible from cover to cover provides us with many examples and also because we, like countless Christians who have gone before us, have experienced God's answers to our prayers in our own lives.

If Jesus was who we believe he was – truly divine and truly human – it is significant that Jesus practiced prayer constantly and urged his followers to do the same, even giving us the Lord's Prayer as model for our own. God invites us to call on the Lord, even in the day of trouble.

So we are commanded to pray. We can also expect God to answer our prayers according to the divine will, a truth that is affirmed in all four Gospels. When we seek to pray according to God's will, we are giving ourselves over to being open to what God desires and trying to align ourselves with God's purposes. This was the prayer of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane: "Not my will be yours be done."

How does God answer prayer? God answers through many means. We often hear it said that God may answer our prayers in three ways: yes, no, and not yet. This affirms that every



prayer has an "answer." The answer may not be what we want or expect or what we think is best. But the answer of prayer is trust. When we perceive God's answer to our prayers, our goal should be to trust those answers as being what is best of us. Just as we trust God to hear our prayers and to answer, so we should trust those answers we receive, even when they seem difficult or hard for us to follow.

Prayer should be a tremendously exciting element of our Christian lives. God is with us, God cares for us, God guides us, God loves us. These affirmations mean that as we pray and seek God's will for our lives, we can trust God's answers and believe we are being lead in the paths God desires. In prayer, we can "expect the unexpected." We never know how, when, or where God will answer our prayers. And that's exciting!
