



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Memphis, Prayers Lent Begins

# PCUSA Stated Clerk Reacts to Altercation in Memphis

(From PCUSA News Service, Jan 30, 2023)

Tyre Nichols was a father, son, friend and co-worker. But on Jan. 7, he became the face and victim of the latest violent clash with law enforcement. He was 29 years old.

The release of body camera and surveillance video last week (Jan 27) shows that Nichols was stopped by police near his home in Memphis, Tennessee, where he was brutally beaten and kicked. Based on the video released by authorities, they continued to beat him until he could not stand. There appeared to be no urgency to administer medical attention.

Law enforcement once again took on the role of judge, jury and executioner. It didn't have to be that way. Now, a child has lost a father, a mother has lost a son and a community mourns another life needlessly taken by those who are sworn to protect them. We keep seeing this play out over and over again as names like George Floyd and Breonna Taylor come to mind.



There is something about policing in this country that must be transformed. While there are good officers out there who care about their communities, there are still those who carry a badge and believe that sets them above the law. We have got to talk about policing in a different way in the U.S. and focus on the toll this behavior is taking on marginalized people. The impact on marginalized individuals spills over into other issues such as a lack of educational opportunities and poverty. It's all part of the death of the human soul. People are being left behind, and as a result, find themselves on the receiving end of injustice as we've witnessed through these videos. There is no respect for human life and that must change.



I call on all Presbyterians and individuals who say they are concerned about human rights and social justice to step up, get involved, connect with your communities. It's not just about social justice. It's about shaping our communi-

ties so that people can be respected regardless of their socioeconomic background. How do we value people again?

I join others across the country who weep for Tyre Nichols as a young promising life was snuffed out too soon. I ache for his family who must live their lives knowing their son didn't have to die. I pray for our country as we struggle to find our way. We must be monitors of this type of behavior, and the faith community has to do something about it. I ask Jesus Christ to come into our hearts, minds and lives, energizing us to make positive change so that this young man and others will not have died in vain.





### Why Do We Mark People with Ashes?

(By David Gambrell in *Presbyterian Worship: Questions and Answers*, Westminster John Knox Press, 2019, page 58)

Ashes are an ancient biblical symbol of repentance, sorrow, poverty, and sacrifice. They are connected with the image of dust as a sign of mortality; as God



told Adam, "You are dust and to dust you shall return."
When Abraham prepared to advocate for the people of Sodom, he said, "Let me take it upon myself to speak to the Lord, I who am but dust and

ashes." When Tamar was raped by Amnon, she put ashes on her face and tore her garments. Job's whole ordeal was framed by ashes and dust—immediately after he was afflicted, he "sat among the ashes," and at the end of God's speech from the whirlwind, he declared he would "repent in dust and ashes." When Jonah gave the people of Nineveh forty days to repent, the king "put on sackcloth and sat in ashes." By contrast, God is the one who "raises the poor from the dust and lifts the needy from the ash heap."

The sign of ashes marks the beginning of the season of Lent. We are marked with ashes, tracing the sign of the cross—the sign of Jesus, who gave his own life for our salvation. At the first service of Lent we face our own mortality, repent of our sing, and commit our lives to the grace of God.

For those who take up spiritual practices during the season of Lent, Ash Wednesday is the beginning of this intentional period of fasting, service, and prayer. . . For all of us, Ash



Wednesday is a call to reconciliation, to be restored to right relationship with God and one another and to seek peace in the world God loves.

Traditionally, the ashes are made by burning the palm branches of Palm Sunday of the previous year. This is fitting, as the symbols of ashes and palms thus frame the season of Lent. The ashes of Ash Wednesday anticipate the dust of death we face on Good Friday. Nevertheless, with the prayers of the psalmists and hope of the prophets, we trust that God will raise us from the ashes and dust.

On the day Valentine was to die (Feb 14), he sent a note to the young girl and signed it "from your Valentine" and from there the custom grew.


