Our Fair Share: Per Capita

Presbyterian congregations fund the operation of our denomination - Generally Assembly, Synods, and Presbyteries - with a fair-share system called Per Capita where each church provides funding based in its size. In 2023 each congregation will remit a Per Capita payment of \$40 times its total number of members. Per Capita enables the larger church to provide the necessary support and connections

Our congregation's Per Capita for 2023 is \$3,360 (\$40 x 84 members) and we will pay it in full. The Session encourages every member to contribute \$40.00 toward our congregation's Per Capita obligation. Please indicate "Per Capita" on your check and provide it by February 28.
