
Meals on Wheels





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Lenten Seeds Maíl, Youth, Lílíes

Lenten Seeds and Growth

Reflection by Rebecca Blair who serves on staff as the Lead Presbyter of Transformation and Stated Clerk of our Presbytery. Reflection was shared on March 1.

Lent calls us to reflect on the aspects of preparation for transformational change witnessed during the forty days that Jesus wandered in the wilder-

ness. There is a compelling metaphor that helps us embrace this wilderness journey that we travel with Jesus. It is the metaphor of the seed. Jesus began his teaching ministry with the parable of the Sower (Matthew 13) and referred to seeds and trees, fruit and branches, throughout his ministry. To see the metaphor of Christian growth and spiritual development contained in a seed is to learn essential lessons about change and transformation.

Seeds Need Good Soil

A seed that lacks appropriate soil may sprout, but will quickly wither and die. Even in the best soil, without water and nutrients, growth will be limited. Without sun and cultivation, plants will decay and spoil. Seeds require a rich, healthy environment in which to grow. In their latency over the winter months, seeds gather nutrition and prepare for spring growth. The quiet introspection of Lent offers us the space in which the seeds of our spiritual lives, the seeds of our growth as disciples may be rooted in the rich soil of risk and security, challenge and inspiration, learning and service.

Growth Happens in Its Own Time

We live in a time-focused cultural economy. Yet, time works differently in natural cycles. Seeds require the amount of time that they require. From God's perspective, the time things take is the right time. The lesson of seeds is a lesson of waiting, of patience, of calm, expectant being as transformative growth happens.

Growth Happens at Its Own Rate

If we plant a package of seeds, we will witness variation and diversity in their rate of growth. Some plants sprout almost immediately and evince a steady rate of growth. Late sprouters often become early bloomers. And sometimes, sprouts that look healthy at first wither and require extra care to thrive. Nothing we do will change this natural diversity. Seeds teach us this lesson of living things, a lesson that applies to our spiritual lives as well, that each unfolds its growth according to its own nature.

Seeds Contain the Past and the Future

Each seed is the product of previous generations and contains within it all the genetic code for the future. Latent within each seed is the germ that prompts transformation. Each generation of plants builds upon the last and lays the foundation for the next generation. Our individual and collective transformation as servant leaders who follow Christ also flows from an essential source according to this cycle. Similarly, the mission and ministry of each of our congregations cyclically grows, matures, and lays the seedbed for its next generation.

Seeds Root Transformation in Calling

Authentic transformation never happens for its own sake, but rather to lead us to something new — new understandings, new spaces, new ideas, new actions, new ways of being. The ultimate purpose of seeds is



not the growth itself, but the fruits that emerge from seeds. In understanding the purpose of seeds more clearly, we can also understand more deeply that Lent offers us the time for preparation and renewal rather than sacrifice and denial, a preparation to bring forth the fruits of our callings.

In 2023, as we continue in conversation about the transformations that God is working in our midst as the Presbytery of Southeastern Illinois, may we be mindful of and attentive to nurturing the seeds planted in our midst that they may grow and flourish, yielding abundant fruits.


