Pastor's Letter

Dear Friends,

As you know, in the Presbyterian tradition, the Session (church board) is called to discern the will of God for the life of the congregation. The Session meets every month to manage all matters in the church, including worship planning, hiring of staff, finance management, building and grounds upkeep, prayer concerns, Presbytery interactions, education and mission programs, and anything else needed to keep the church moving faithfully forward. Our Session is made of nine elders and the pastor, so we have ten voting members.

I've been moderating Session meetings for many years now and can say that our Sessions discuss issues well and routinely make decisions with unanimous support. Determining God's will is never a clear cut



endeavor, but I know we do our best. We are blessed to have a spirit of reverence and hope guiding us at Session meetings. We are blessed by the elders who serve.

The Session is looking to begin a younger youth group for K-5th graders. The group would meet maybe twice a month, much like our older youth group does. Activities would include fellowship, food, crafts, Bible stories, games, and maybe some mission projects. The planning will take some time, but we are working on it.

The Session continues to be in conversation with the Community Development Institute about the possibility of having our church be the host site for the Federal Head Start program in Hoopeston. CDI would lease our preschool room for one classroom and the lower level for a second classroom. CDI is currently working with the State Fire Marshall's office to find a way to make our lower level compliant with fire codes for Head Start facilities. We are hoping that these compliancy issues can be worked out, but time will tell.

The Session is looking to find a way to replace the dying ash trees in the parking lot island sometime next spring or summer. It's unfortunate to lose these trees.

The Session is continually looking for ways to support local youth programs with the McFarland Endowment Fund entrusted to our care. Every year, we strive to support many different programs for all ages of children - infant to normal collage age - as Dick McFarland asked us to do. If you hear of a need in town, contact a Session member or myself and we will have the Session consider the cause. We have about \$20,000 to distribute every year.

How Can We Make Worship More Seeker Friendly?

(By David Gambrell in Presbyterian Worship: Questions and Answers, Westminster John Knox Press, 2019.)

The most powerful, effective way of drawing others into Christian life is to live that life as fully as you can, as an offering of thanks and praise for the grace of God. Here are seven ideas on how to do that. These are not intended to be a road map for renewal or strategies for success; in fact, they may be counterintuitive, contradicting conventional wisdom on church growth.

Embrace mystery. Seekers are seeking something . . . And it's probably not a lecture on Presbyterian worship. Let songs, symbols, and silence speak. Don't try to fill up every space in the service with explanations of things we scarcely understand. Just point to the glory of God.



Keep it simple. The beauty of Christian worship is that it doesn't require many ingredients – word, water, bread, and cup; the gathering of the beloved body of Christ; the sending of God's people in mission to the world. Focus on these things – as though your live depends on them. They are signs of the saving grace of God.

Be who you are. Inauthenticity stinks and seekers can smell it a mile away. Be the "aroma of Christ" (2 Cor 2:15). Bear witness to what Christ is doing among you, in your own awesomely awkward, clumsily charming way. Don't try to be who you think seekers want you to be. But . . .

Be ready to change. Newcomers will bring new songs, new prayers, new offerings, and yes, new challenges. They'll change the way you worship. Receive this as a gift, with gratitude. Christian life is a pilgrimage. Seekers may be God's way of saying, "Keep moving."

Love your neighbors. Get to know your neighborhood. Contribute to your community. And when you gather for worship, pray for that community; collect items for the food bank; recruit volunteers for the soup kitchen and community garden. Get involved.

Love one another. This is how people will know you are Jesus' disciples: how you shake hands before the service begins, how you embrace at the passing of the peace, how you lift up one another in prayer, how you stoop down to serve Communion to children, and so on.

Love God . . . And just worship. Worship God with joy, with delight, with abandon. Let go of your anxiety about "doing it right." Only God is holy. Nothing will be more compelling or attractive to seekers in your midst than authentic prayer and praise to the true and living God.
